Why?

- 1987 meeting in Ottawa
- 1989 consultations from across Canada with clinicians and researchers working with older adults Alzheimer disease and related dementias
- 1989 grant to University of Ottawa to staff Coordinating Centre



Why?

- Objectives for the 1991 CSHA-1 study were:
 - 1. To estimate the prevalence of dementia among elderly Canadians;
 - 2. To identify risk factors for Alzheimer's disease and for vascular dementia;
 - 3. To describe patterns of caring for patients with dementia in Canada and to assess the burden that caring places on the caregivers;
 - 4. To establish a database for subsequent followup studies.

Why?

 At CSHA-1 about a dozen add-on studies were undertaken

• Spin-off studies included the development of further diagnostic criteria for cognitive impairment, which influenced the subsequent development of CSHA-2, the second wave of the study.



How?

 - Subcommittees struck to identify information to be collected in each component of the study
 - Screening
 - Clinical
 - Nursing and Medical
 - Neuropsychology
 - Caregiver
 - Risk factor
